

The military officers' quarters which were part of the government camp were constructed in circa 1854.

The picture above shows a building that, historically is important to Castlemaine. It was a time capsule having stood there not lived in for more than a generation. There were moves to save this building, which may still be going on, I don't know. It was sold before auction minus the contents of the house. They had been bought privately. I knew the buyer and approached him to see if there was "stuff" we would like to add to our collection. Our charter specifically states "to collect preserve and promote Castlemaines history". When I saw the collection, some of it had already been sold. The ephemera I thought had to be saved. It covered a father and son. Their history of everyday life, work and social, I didn't hesitate negotiated a price and bought it on the spot. The family hailed from Scotland in 1874 settling in Fryerstown before moving to Castlemaine. Below are two love letters taken from the collection written early last century. No burning pages, just one name anonymity preserved a picture of gentler and more innocent times.

My own dear loving pet. Once more I have the pleasure of writing to you, it is a pity we cannot meet oftener but some day when the wind blows the right way I shall see you, we will have a donkey ride together, won't that be fun, now my precious don't drown your with tears as I cannot be with you oftener. When Christmas comes I will bring you a handsome present, be sure you don't tell anyone what I propose, or I might forget to bring it. O'h you little dumpy darling I will give you such a squeeze you next. time. Don't forget to think of me and dream sweet dreams of true loving hearts. Now dearest love

Your ever loving Sweetheart Your own True Love.

My sweetest and best, since I left you in Collins Street the other night. I have been unable to sleep a for thinking about you Your darling little bright eyes like two stars winking at me in the dark. When will you meet me again dear, restore that heavenly calm I always feel when with you. I feel so happy that I am too full for words and can't think of half the words I want to to tell you. Directly you get this you You must send me a line with an appointment of some nice quiet spot Near the G.P.O. that will be convenient to both of us. I do hope it will be a fine starry night. You remember what you promised me at our last meeting, a kiss for every star but non shall be brighter than your dear eyes. Ever of Thee, Toby.

The letters were written on two very small very fragile pieces of pink paper with a letter head. Bits and pieces of the collection will be published in future newsletters to keep you interested with an ulterior motive: the collection cost money and will need more to digitise, archive and store properly. If any of you would like to throw in a \$ or two, to help this project, feel free to do so, Barbara and I will start the ball rolling with \$50. Treasurer Gary will take your money with a smile and give you a receipt.

Below are a few small titbits from the above collection to whet your appetite.



140 years ago Special Meeting Feb 29th 1884

a leap year. Thes minutes were written when we were young and keen. The secretary of the day wrote very detailed minutes giving us today a very clear, picture of people, places and events. Due to space restrictions I have omitted some procedural matters Ed. Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. The chairman Mr, Gaulton stated that the object of the meeting was to consider how the should hold the annual celebration. The committee at the last meeting made a recommendation to hold it at the Botanical Gardens, in the same way as 3 years ago. Mr. Thimbleby felt it should be held on a public holiday. Mr. Mitchell remarked, the proposition for observing it in March was on account of the time the Society was founded. An opinion was expressed that a public holiday was unsuitable as the sports on the Camp, would be more attractive than the Pioneers amusements. Mr. Thimbleby proposed that Wednesday 19th March be the day

appointed. Mr. Graham seconded, the motion was carried. Mr. Thimbleby suggested that the celebrations be held at Malmsbury Resivior, where there were plenty of boats. This brought about questions of funds, the hour of departing, the mode of conveyance and the conveyance of families. Mr. Cooper thought that Lake Johanna too near to town, and for enjoyment if was best to go away to another place where there was the novelty of new scenery, moreover he said, if the railway was guaranteed 100 persons a special train could be procured. Mr. reid recommended an excursion to Sorrento. Sandhurst people have had two trips there, and by arrangement had the whole ferry to Sorrento and back for 17/6d. Mr. Graham was in favour of the celebration being held in the Botanical Gardens and this view was adopted.

It was at this point I think, some Pioneers started to think of Ferries, Sorrento, Queenscliff and the start of our future excursions. Ed.
